SB 125 Fund Overview

- SB 125 guides the distribution of \$5.1 billion in General Fund + GGRF
- Funds can be used flexibly to support transit operations or priority capital improvements
 - Intent was to provide one-time multiyear bridge funding for transit operators to address operational costs until long-term transit sustainability solutions are identified
- \$4 billion through Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP) available in fiscal years 2023-24, 2024-25, and 2025-26 on a populationbased formula to regional transportation planning agencies
- \$1.1 billion through Zero Emission Transit Capital Program (ZETCP) available in fiscal years 2023-24; 2024-25; 2026-27; 2027-28






SB 125 Disbursements to Date

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>93% of the first tranche of funding has been approved

Approvals to Date



Remaining Funding

- 45 out of 49 agencies requested initial allocations
- 40 out of these 45 have received approval. Remaining 5 agencies are expected to receive approval imminently
- Remaining funds represents ~7% of total



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Upcoming Milestones

- Final guidelines governing the funding for FY 2024-25 released 1/10/2025
- Updated allocation summaries and first annual report due by 2/28/2025
- FY 2024-25 funding will be approved no later than 4/30/2025
- Next iteration of the guidelines is due by 9/30/2025
- Updated guidelines may include a template, or other technical assistance, outlining the requirements for the required long-term financial plan



Long-Term Financial Plan Requirement

- Long-term plans are due by 6/30/2026
- Plans must address the strategy to sustain each region's transit operations absent additional funding
- Plans must demonstrate ridership retention and recovery strategies
- Plans must include a five-year forecast of operating funding requirements with detail on all sources of funding for proposed operations

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
